Dear Northwest Intermountain Synod,

Blessings on your annual meeting, a time to celebrate, deliberate, elect leaders, consider how your budget (or mission spending plan) reflects who you are and who you are becoming. I pray that meetings across our synod will be steeped in prayer and compassion as well as gratitude for the opportunity to be the body of Christ in your particular contexts.

The English word *synod* combines two Greek words that literally mean “a way together.” In and through synods, congregations and other ministries “walk together.” I want to share here some of the ways we walked together in 2025.

This past summer, we leveraged your Mission Support dollars by applying for and receiving a \$20,000 CaSTLE Grant from Wartburg Seminary (*The Country and Small Town Lived Ecclesiology Project*) for rural ecumenical experiments. Three one-day events were held at Immanuel Lutheran, Moses Lake (Oct. 25), Our Savior Lutheran, Clarkston, WA (Nov. 1), and First United Methodist, Pocatello (Nov. 15). The grant funded our two professional facilitators and paid for lunch at each event. Geographic cohorts created at these in-person events will receive team coaching, funded by the grant. Dec. 1-3, Bishop Meggan, Pastor Phil, Pastor Liv, and bishops/leaders from the Episcopal Church, United Methodist Church, United Church of Christ, and Presbyterian Church USA gathered for mutual learning at St. Gertrude’s Monastery near Cottonwood, ID (another gathering funded by the grant). We applied for a second grant of \$20,000 in November, and Wartburg said, “We’d like to give you the grant and another \$10,000. How would you use it?” They liked our response. Look for the press release in our e-newsletter and website for how we will use our next grant. Look for three more United at the Font events!

Meanwhile, the call process continued for many ministry sites and the year included a number of installations in our synod. We currently have eight ministry candidates active in the candidacy process (the path for becoming an ordained pastor or deacon). I think next January, our number could be much higher thanks to all of you who are raising up future pastors and deacons. Speaking of leaders, nearly 15 lay people attended our fall Preach, Pray, Preside, and Polity lay leader retreat at the Grunewald Guild and plans are in the works for a similar retreat in Jerome, Idaho in May 2026. We enjoyed a wonderful visit this fall from Pastors Ezekiel and Wilson from the Ulanga Kilombero Diocese, our companion synod in Tanzania. Plans are underway for a trip to the UKD in the summer of 2026. Our established campus ministries continue to share God’s abundant grace in Moscow, Pullman, Cheney and Spokane. Through congregational visits, deans’ meetings, First Call Theological Education (for those in their first three years of ordained ministry), Bishop’s Fall Convocation, and the synod electronic newsletter, we continue to stay connected as a synod.

We do this ministry as a synod staff, synod council, and various committees and teams so that our ministry sites, that’s YOU, can continue to be Wellsprings of God’s love, sharing the love, freedom, and mercy we know through Jesus Christ. As I say often, the world needs that message more than ever in this moment. Thank you for proclaiming the gospel through your words and actions in your particular context. Blessings again on your annual meetings.

DATE: January 26, 2025

Meeting called to order at 10:55 by President Annie Frederick.

Opening Prayer from Pastor Bob Albing.

ATTENDEES:

Approximately 50 people were in attendance.

MINUTES OF THE LAST MEETING:

Minutes of the last annual meeting, held on January 28, 2024, were reviewed.

Motion to approve the minutes as written was made by Gary Heckathorn and seconded by Pat Buckley.

Motion carried and minutes were approved.

Reports:

Presidents Report (Annie Frederick)

Annie thanked everyone for what they have done for the church. No questions from the congregation.

Pastor Report: (Pastor Bob Albing)

Pastor Bob encouraged everyone to read the Pastor's Report and thanked everyone for making his time as Interim Pastor enjoyable.

Treasurer Report: (Kristi Bell)

Kristi thanked everyone for what church does for the community. Church did not reach 2024 goal for donations and offerings. Kristi will be communicating through church bulletin the monthly goals and the progress made at each point. Kristi mentioned the various ways for congregants to make offerings including offering basket, mail, and website. She is looking into having a church VENMO account as well. She thanked everyone who makes the treasurer report possible including Lauretta Heaney financial secretary; Sandy Duley, bookkeeper; and Ken Brown and all on stewardship committee.

Financial Secretary (Lauretta Heaney)

Annie thanked Lauretta for everything she does as financial secretary. Lauretta said budget report was incorrect as this is the information from previous year.

Education (Shannon Radke, Monica Jones, Terry Zakar)

No one was present from the committee. Annie gave an overview of the committee responsibilities and thanked them for their dedication.

Evangelism: (Val Samson, Sandy Loskill, Carleen Bliesner-Bowen)

No one from committee was present. Annie explained responsibilities of the committee and thanked committee members.

Missions & Social Concerns: (Mary Bug Smith, Jeff Bell, Bob Kowal)

Jeff Bell thanked the committee members. Because of generosity of congregation, Second Harvest was such a success that the location has been moved to Newport Rodeo Grounds for more space. Jeff was happy to report that \$11,000 was given out to local non-profits.

Property and Maintenance: (Toby Johnson Jason Jones Dennis Alliger)

Jason introduced himself and other members of the committee. Furnaces were a major project for 2024 but maintenance has been pretty low key since then. Jason especially thanked Dennis for his dedication and hard work on the committee.

Stewardship: (Ken Brown, David Grice, Sophie Hinchliff) .

Ken explained that the budget as printed is correct but the stewardship report is incorrect. Congregation was thanked for approximately \$195,000 in faithful giving. Total amount in giving was about 5 percent below 2024 goal. There were furnace issues but also many donations to offset the cost. Ken mentioned that the church contributes to the community giving peace, food, shelter and light. This year's budget is basically the same with a 1.8 percent increase due to pay rates, utilities and insurance. With about \$1,000 more a month in offerings, church will be able to meet goal.

Worship & Music: (Nancy Sauer, Millie Brumbaugh, Hedy Mitchell)

Hedy expressed thankfulness for congregation's help in duties.

Anna Circle (Joy Peralta, Lieesa Thorton, Sandy Ellersick, Trish Akre)

Hedy explained that Anna Circle is a portion of the quilters group and includes Bible study and a short meeting. Besides local quilts that were distributed locally, 59 quilts were sent to World Relief. New participants are always welcome.

NEW BUSINESS:**Budget 2025:**

Ken Brown summarized the 2025 budget. He discussed how donations for church have been flat recently but hopeful for an increase to meet budget goals. Only minor changes were made for the 2025 budget. A question from a parishioner on why there was a deficit in 2024. Reasons included furnace repair, insurance increase and a drop in giving. number. Marva Heckathorn made a motion to accept the 2025 budget and Gary Heckathorn seconded the motion.

Motion was approved.

Nominating committee: (Katie Kersting, Jason Jones, Amber Reynolds)

Katie thanked everyone on the committee. Changes in the stepping down and nomination of new members in various committees are as follows: Jeff Bell is stepping down from Missions Committee and Debbie Buckley is nominated to join. Sophie Hinchliff is stepping down from Stewardship and Pat Buckley is nominated to join. Shannon Radke is stepping

down from Education and Kelli Youk is nominated to join.

Gary Heckthron made motion to accept the nominations and Ken Brown seconded the motion. Motion was carried. Annie thanked Pam Thompson for being secretary.

Call committee:

Members for the Call Committee were invited to come forward. It was mentioned that prayers were gratefully appreciated for the work that they do. There is a new candidate for Pastor and committee will meet after the annual meeting concludes. A question from the congregation on what is the Call Committee. The committee was formed to search and to find a new pastor for the church.

New business:

Hedy wanted to publicly acknowledge gratefulness for Nancy Sauer serving as music director for 44 years. A vote of confidence was given by all to Pastor Bob Albing as serving as interim pastor for the church and also to Mary Morrow for her pleasant participation.

Meeting adjourned at 11:20.

Call Committee

Our Call Committee continues to work in harmony with the guidance of the Holy Spirit to call a permanent Pastor to serve ALC. We are so appreciative of our congregations' prayerful support and patience as we wait for God to present us with the best match. We continue to appreciate Pastor Bob and his wife Mary as they guide our entire congregation through growth and transition and prepare us to welcome a new Pastor.

We had the blessing this past summer of having a supply pastor with lots of experience in the calling of new pastors to review our original Ministry Site Profile and offer some suggestions. We updated some of our descriptions to better reflect and show who we are as we move through our transition. Our Call Committee was decreased by one member as David Grice and his family relocated out of state. We discussed with Pastor Phil Misner and with Pastor Bob and decided to continue with our cohesive group of six committee members.

In 2025 we were presented with seven more candidates. We interviewed via zoom with five thus far and we have two more candidates to meet with in January and February of 2026. Of the five we met with we felt as a committee that two were not the right fit for our congregation and the other three candidates were called to serve another congregation and withdrew their application prior to a second Zoom meeting. We remain patient and know that God has someone in mind for us.

We continue to ask for your prayers as we allow the Holy Spirit to lead us to the right Pastor for this amazing congregation. We will continue to keep you updated.

Thank you again for the honor of having served ALC.



The Year End Congregational Meeting at the end of January was followed by a potluck.

During the year, the Fellowship Committee held several Name Tag Sundays. Name tags were reprinted and new lanyards and strap clips were set up thanks to Laretta Heaney and Sandy Loskill.

WWW has worked on a renaming, and the sense is that it's now Women with Wonderful Wisdom. These gatherings continued monthly throughout the year and were well attended.

With much help from congregation members, Soup Suppers were held during Lent.

In June, a Church and Picnic in the Park event was scheduled but subsequently had to be moved indoors due to inclement weather. Despite the change in venue, it was a joyous occasion.

Our college and military youth were sent Halloween greetings from the congregation.

Oktoberfest was held with brats, hot dogs, buns and condiments provided through a Thrivent grant. Congregation members supplied salads and desserts.

Throughout the Fall, socks, gloves and hats were donated and then distributed to Newport, Priest River and Cusick food banks as well as to the Pend Orielle River School, Youth Emergency Services and the Hospitality House. Another Thrivent grant was used to amass a large number of socks.

In December, the Church was decorated for the Christmas season. The Smith family provided an outstanding tree, which was beautifully decorated.

Our home bound members were kept connected through visits, calls and cards. Thanks to Faith Hughes for organizing a caroling party complete with cookie trays for the people visited.

We are grateful for all the help volunteered throughout the year, especially since our committee seemed plagued with health problems. Hopefully we are all healed and ready for fellowship opportunities in 2026. Thanks to all. God bless and keep smiling!

Mission Committee Report

The Mission Committee would like to thank all ALC volunteers that made 2025 such a success. Especially providing the workforce for our five 2nd Harvest events. Also thanks to our ALC member sponsors. Each successive event served more families and food.

In total we served 1683 families and 72029 meals. We had 176 volunteers and 547 volunteer hours for the 5 events. Any left-over was donated to the Newport Food Bank. Our new location at the Newport Rodeo Grounds worked out well to accommodate the growing numbers of cars. We appreciate working with the City of Newport on this change.

Our 2026 2nd Harvest Mobile Market dates are: Thursday, March 19th, Thursday, May 7th, and tentative dates Thursday, June 11th, Thursday, September 10th, and Thursday, November 12th. Please let us know if you have an interest in being a 2026 sponsor.

Thanks to those who are donating food at the Church. Those donations are going to Newport Food Bank, Cusick Food Bank and Priest River Food Bank.

We distributed \$7000 to Second Harvest and a total of \$5400 to eight non-profit organizations throughout Pend Oreille, Spokane, and Bonner Counties. These organizations include: Family Crisis Network, Rural Resources, Hospice of Spokane, Priest River Food Bank, Orchard Ridge, Lutheran Community Services, Cusick Food Bank and Newport Food Bank.

Property and Maintenance Report

- Winter 2025:
 - *Snow removal was contracted to Johnson Land Works (local contractor) they are working with us to be on an on-call schedule to minimize expenses.
- Spring 2025:
 - *Annual Spring cleanup of grounds and lot was done.
 - *A couple more sprinkler valves and sprinkler heads replaced
 - *Lawn mowing on routine schedule as well as fertilizing
 - *Sprinkler supply line behind church was repaired due to failure.
- Fall 2025:
 - *Fall ground cleanup day performed. Many trees and shrubs near the church were pruned up and cut back to improve health as well as to give a buffer against the building. Also, a few hazard trees were cut down, turned to firewood and donated.
 - *Installation process programable thermostats on remaining furnaces. This is giving us more efficiency with our heating and cooling and saving money on our utility costs
 - *Church garage was broken in to and a trimmer, gas can, and leaf blower were stolen. We have new doors to install, and additional metal guarding is being built to go over these doors for added protection.
 - Security cameras have now been installed for outside perimeter surveillance
- Winter 2025:
 - *Winter snow removal is scheduled again with Johnson Land works
 - *Work started on updating lighting to LED in conjunction with PUD.

Thank you to all the members of the church who help with the property committee. We know there are a lot of tasks that many of you do without being asked. We thank you all for all the help throughout the year.

Stewardship Committee Report

As we start a new year, I am pleased to submit a report that reflects the faithful and generous financial support of the congregation for fiscal year 2025. As you know, a lull in late summer and fall giving put us behind our budget plan for the year. But strong end-of-year giving helped us finish strong and ahead of our giving budget goal, ending up at \$217,034. That is \$12,034 above budget allowing us to not dip into our reserve funds to balance the budget. When coupled with cost savings that we realized in various areas such as snow removal and interim housing expenses we are ending the year with a budget surplus. Praise God! I marvel at what the Lord has provided for our ministry through your generous response and support.

In addition to the giving above, we also received designated funding of \$550 for the furnace fund, \$1,084 for the food bank fund, \$3,300 for Second Harvest (not including other Second Harvest funding sources), \$2,837 from yard sales, and \$300 for the youth fund. And we ended the year receiving a large one-time gift to our memorial fund.

I thought you might be interested to know the split between online giving and in-person giving. \$24,000 (11%) came in via online methods with the remainder coming in the form of checks/cash.

For 2026 we will continue our plan to cover the costs of our interim Pastor, guest speakers, and the ongoing needs of the Call Committee during the search for a full-time pastor. In response to the State of Washington's 2.8% increase in the minimum wage that was effective as of January 1, 2026, we are planning an increase to salaries by the new rate. Other expense line items were evaluated and adjusted by looking at actual spending patterns and potential increases in utility and insurance rates, and inflation. We are continuing a focus on cost savings and expense control which will allow us to keep anticipated expenses flat for 2026 compared to last year.

On a personal note, let me say that it has been a pleasure to serve the congregation these past 3 years as a member of the stewardship committee. As I come to the end of my term, I want to thank each of you for your faithful support and the encouragement you provided to me and others serving on the committee. It has been a joy to see how the Lord, working through this congregation, has enabled us to meet our operating expenses, continued to richly support those in need in the greater community around us, and to serve and share the love of Christ around the world.
